In 2014-2015 the University consumed **243 million kWh** of energy - enough to power all of Cambridge's streetlights each night, for 92 years!


This equates to over £16 million a year, which is £1,865 an hour.

The biggest spend was on electricity - £12.8m –and while much of this energy is used in vital research, some of it is wasted through poor bad practices and out dated equipment.

You can help reduce the amount of electricity we use in the Department by:

- Switching off lights and your computer monitor when you leave the room
- Turning off your computer and printer at the end of the day
- Making sure you don't leave laptop or mobile phone chargers plugged in to the socket when not in use
- Avoiding using electric heaters
